#### Why Jewish Studies?

Jewish Studies curricula and programs encourage appreciation of diversity by highlighting the many contributions, perspectives, and experiences of Jews around the world. The study of Judaism provides deeper understanding of both Christianity and Islam, and Jewish heritage is deeply interwoven across the larger arc of human history. On all levels, learning about the Jewish story illuminates the human condition as it relates to all peoples.



#### A Key to Diversity Training

Earning a Jewish Studies Certificate or Minor signals potential employers that you are educated about diversity issues, appreciate multiple ethnic and religious heritages, and are trained in the history and legacy of discriminatory practices.

#### Events and Lecture Series

The Jewish Studies Program sponsors events and lectures open to the public every semester, engaging the campus and wider community with experts and authors sharing their research on the vibrant history and resilient culture of the Jewish people have included talks on poetry in the Warsaw Ghetto, Jewish Americans in 1930s Los Angeles, global Jewish food cultures, and Jews in North Africa. The Program also regularly sponsors films and had a tree planting for the Jewish holiday of Tu B'Shevat, the Jewish New Year of the Trees.



#### Jewish Studies Minor

The Minor in Jewish Studies augments students' major course work, and prepares students for graduate education, especially in history, Jewish Studies, international relations, religious studies, and philosophy, and professional training and careers in teaching, law, public sector administration, service and advocacy, foreign service and diplomacy, museums, religious organizations, business, human resources, and creative fields.

Students earn a Minor in Jewish Studies by taking courses in Jewish history, religion, culture, politics and/ or Hebrew language and completing all courses with a grade of C or better. The Minor requires a total of 15 units from at least two disciplines, with a minimum of one lower division course (3 units) and two upper division courses (6 units). The remaining courses (6 units) may be selected from any lower- or upper-division electives.

### Jewish Studies Certificate

Another option for students is to earn a Certificate in Jewish Studies, which requires four upper division classes. By taking five upper division courses, and maintaining a 3.5 GPA in eligible courses, students can earn a Certificate with Honors.

#### Course Offerings

As an interdisciplinary program, the Jewish Studies Program encourages conversations across departments, colleges, and programs campus-wide. Courses are offered on a range of topics and include those focused solely on the Jewish experience and others that consider Jewish ethnicity and difference within wider frameworks.

#### Courses include:

- JS10: Jewish Civilization
- JSIOOW: Writing about the Jewish Experience
- English 116/Philosophy 134: Literature of the Old Testament
- Hebrew IA: Basic Hebrew
- History 140: Holocaust
- History 154: Jewish American Popular Culture
- History 181: Anti-Semitism
- Philosophy 154: Judaism.

Special topics courses are also offered, such as History 179T: Jews and American Film. Internships with local Jewish organizations are available and can be taken for course credit.


